## Upcoming International Conference: Heidegger, Daoism, and Intercultural Thinking Today

Institute of Philosophy, Slovak Academy of Sciences, v.v.i. Bratislava, Slovak Republic May 21-22, 2024

The philosophical pathways of Martin Heidegger were interwoven with East Asian interlocutors and sources throughout his lifetime. Heidegger first engaged visiting Japanese students and scholars in 1919, and his philosophy was already known in Japan by the late 1920s, where the first translations of his writings were published. Heidegger not only dialogued with, befriended, and even collaborated with Chinese and Japanese intellectuals throughout his life, but also his lectures and writings directly and indirectly interpreted Daoist and other East Asian sources over decades. Heidegger's paths in thinking continue to be pivotal for encounters and dialogues between European and East Asian philosophies and for contemporary intercultural thinking. Responding to recent work on Heidegger and Daoist philosophy, particularly Eric S. Nelson's monograph Heidegger and Dao (Bloomsbury, 2023) and David Chai's edited volume Daoist Resonances in Heidegger (Bloomsbury, 2022), the papers presented at this two-day conference will explore questions and topics addressing Heidegger's thinking, Daoist and East Asian philosophy, and the possibilities and pitfalls of intercultural dialogue and philosophy today.
