1.7. Mission Statement of the Institute as presented in the Foundation Charter indicating the years when it was adopted and revised

Mission Statement of the Centre of Social and Psychological Sciences Slovak Academy of Sciences ("CSPS" or "Centre") from the Foundation Charter; adopted in 2015, revised in 2018 and 2021:

The CSPS was established on 1.10.2015 by a merger of three research facilities: Institute of Social Sciences, Institute for Forecasting and Institute of Experimental Psychology. The main mission of the CSPS is to perform research activities, and to collect, process and disseminate scientific information. The CSPS is focused on interdisciplinary basic and applied research in the following areas:

1. History, sociology, economics, demography and demo-geography, socio-cultural and socio-political aspects, and its relations to the development of Slovakia in a central European context;

2. Slovak history of the 20th century, mostly the development of ethnic minorities in Slovakia and in near border regions of our neighboring countries in the context of European history;
3. Social psychology, organizational psychology, cognitive psychology, neuropsychology and school psychology;
4. Psychological processes of personality with the goal of understanding psychological aspects of optimal human functioning in various life situations: work, problem-solving, stressful situations, decision making, educations, micro - and macro – social interactions;
5. Theoretical, methodological, and conceptual problems of forecasting of Slovak society development in a national and global context;
6. Socio-economic dimension of global and environmental changes, environmental management and space planning;
7. Co-evolution of institutional and technological change.

The CSPS develops analysis and concepts of policies in the field of economic, social, technological, and environmental developments for the purposes of state agencies, local authorities, and important national and international organizations. The CSPS provides consultancy and expert services for state institutions, national and international cultural bodies, and other institutions and organizations. It cooperates with universities in the provision of graduate education in internal and external forms that result in granting tertiary university education pertaining to PhD degrees. The CSPS carries out publication of the results of research and scientific activities by the means of periodical and non-periodical print.

Last revision of Mission Statement (2021):

(1) The predominant main activity of the organization is the implementation of research in the fields of science: Psychological sciences, Social sciences, Economic sciences and business, Historical sciences and archeology, Social and Economic Geography.

Since the last Accreditation in 2016, the Centre of Social and Psychological Sciences has further developed its potential for scientific growth and research development. The foundation of the CSPS in 2015 responded to a global trend towards interdisciplinary research, by establishing an institution with a critical mass of senior as well as junior scholars with diverse but related research interests. Currently the Centre represents a unique community of researchers in Psychology, Economics and History with interdisciplinary overlaps with Sociology, Environmental and Political Sciences. The multi- and interdisciplinary nature of the Centre makes it a strong research institution and flexible partner for scientific projects at both national and international levels.

We would like to highlight several areas of national or international scientific importance with societal impact that have been systematically researched at the Centre between 2016 - 2021.

The research focus has shifted from decision-making to **reasoning and rationality, with two broad approaches toward rationality – instrumental and epistemic**. Instrumental rationality refers to the effectiveness of people's reasoning processes and how well they can apply intuitive and analytical processes to the reasoning tasks at hand, while epistemic rationality refers to how accurately people's beliefs reflect the world and available knowledge around them. The key questions researched were why people exhibit various cognitive failures, namely, why they often cannot choose the best alternative and rather endorse beliefs that are harmful in the long-term perspective, and how to help them to make better decisions. The scientific importance of our results lies in identifying some of the cognitive factors that are more associated with rational choices, such as mindware instantiation (Burič & Šrol, 2020; Šrol & De Neys, 2020; Burič & Konrádová, 2021), and with scientific reasoning (Čavojová, Šrol & Jurkovič, 2020; Šrol, 2022). Our study about scientific reasoning was the first to establish its role as a protective mindware against epistemically suspect beliefs in the international scientific context. Importantly, our results enabled us to start collaboration with other research institutes and NGOs on developing tools and educational interventions to enhance scientific reasoning of students and the general public.

One of the key examples of the theoretical and societal impact of our results is research on **vaccination hesitancy**, which gained large public and scientific attention during the COVID-19 pandemic. Vaccination hesitancy is closely connected to epistemically suspect beliefs (such as conspiracy theories, pseudo-scientific and paranormal beliefs) (Šrol, Čavojová, & Ballová Mikušková, 2021). Such a lack of scientific understanding further undermines people's willingness to vaccinate themselves and/or their children. The results of our research helped to identify the predictors of conspiracy theories about COVID-19 and the unwillingness to comply with the preventive regulations during the pandemic.

The knowledge and experiences in the field of decision-making addressed in previous periods have been utilised in a new research stream focusing on **psychological aspects of decision-making about personal and business finances**. For instance, we found that Slovak women report a lower entrepreneurial intention than men not because of their gender (as previous studies suggested), but because they imagine a successful entrepreneur as masculine and believe they do not have the masculine abilities required for such a profession (Adamus, Čavojová & Šrol, 2021). Another study contributed to the recent debate about inconsistent findings on how entrepreneurs' start-up

and managerial experience affect their ability to design a good business plan (Hanák & Grežo, 2020). We found that start-up experience had a positive effect on quality, but managerial experience had not. This research focus also flexibly responded to **questions linked to COVID-19 pandemic**. A study by Adamus and Grežo (2021) found that individuals with low psychological resources perceived greater **financial threat** which, in turn, was associated with their higher willingness to cut their expenses, increase their incomes, and decrease their debts. The study also showed that, compared to long-term financial stressors, acute changes in one's financial situation caused by the COVID-19 pandemic had a greater potential to induce financial threat and, thus, were more responsible for the changes in one's financial behaviour. Further, research focusing on **medical professionals in emergency services** gained increasing importance in the context of COVID-19 pandemic. The key focus was on key non-technical skills (social and cognitive) which were evaluated based on opinions and experiences of medical professionals and clients of the emergency medical service (EMS), as well as on the analysis of the performance of medical professionals in realistically simulated situations of emergency medical interventions. We found evidence that such skills are important for the quality of the work of the emergency medical service. The results of this project significantly deepen the current scientific knowledge about the importance of adequate situational awareness, naturalistic decision-making, teamwork and team leadership in the context of urgent pre-hospital health care. The results emphasized the importance of self-emotion control as an important part of stress and fatigue, as well as the ability to communicate effectively with the patient, their relatives or accidental witnesses of emergency medical intervention in situations that directly threaten the life or health of patients.

Another stream of research relates to the issue of **adaptation to retirement**. Our research focused on adjustment to retirement transition from the point of view of recently retired Slovak individuals and analyzed factors that help or block this process. Our results pointed to the importance of creating a new lifestyle with a new daily routine in order to avoid a lack of a framework. Retirees can benefit from retirement planning and maintaining an active lifestyle, which is in line with the concept of active aging, to date, not adopted at policy or practical levels in Slovakia. These results provide a basis for interventions aimed at increasing support for health-related behaviours, as well as increasing psychological and social preparation for retirement. (Záhorcová, Halama et al., 2021; Halama, Záhorcová et al., 2021, Bačová, Halama, 2021). We developed an intervention programme based on providing information on retirement planning for people of pre-retirement age. Our results regarding the effect of the intervention program may indicate that the provision of information alone may not be enough to initiate the preparation effort. The results of this research had a strong societal impact, especially through influencing social discourse on retirement.

One of the flagships of the CSPS, the **European Social Survey ERIC - Slovak site**, which has been coordinated in Slovakia by the CSPS team since 2004, progressed in the evaluated period. The team has successfully prepared and coordinated the fieldwork and delivered representative data from Slovakia for the ESS Round 9 and Round 10. In 2018 the Slovak team reached a full-member-status within RI ESS ERIC. The data collected in Slovakia during the 9th ESS Round facilitated an inquiry of domestic opinions and its comparison with other EU countries, including issues such as the perception of justice, quality of life, political participation, family norms, attitudes to migration, or the internet usage. The outputs of the inquiry were published by the national team CSPS in Slovakia (Fedáková, Kentoš & at al., 2020), and abroad. They were also presented at international conferences and in a series of presentations for the broad public. The ESS national team attempts to popularize the data and its significance among scholars, politicians as well as the public. Two ESS special issues of the journal *Individual and Society* were published in 2019 and 2021 with contributions from Slovenia, Hungary, Estonia, Czechia and Slovakia. Moreover, the team was selected within a competition to perform the ESS Pilot survey for Round 9 in Slovakia and to test experimental tablets designed for respondents with no digital skills (ESS Electronic Questionnaire Device). One of the strongest societal impacts of the ESS Slovak team is its contribution with the national datasets that are freely available for academics and other stakeholders to enhance good quality research, policy reports and media news.

Further, **ethnic, minority, regional and border studies** remain the core focus of the historical research in the bordering region of east Slovakia. From the perspective of microhistory and cultural history, respective historians inquired (chronologically) about the following themes: situational ethnicity in the ethnically heterogeneous urban milieu of the city of Košice (Ficeri, 2018, 2020); adaptation strategies of public employees in the transition period of 1918 – 1920 (Szeghy-Gayer, 2021); the outbreak of the Spanish flu in 1918 – 1919 (Szeghy-Gayer, 2021); persecution of Jews in Košice and nationalisation of their properties (Szeghy-Gayer, 2020, 2021); the population exchange between Czechoslovakia and Hungary in the aftermath of the World War II (Šutaj, 2018; Heldáková, 2019, 2020) the politics of ethnicity of the communist Czechoslovak regime in regard to Ruthenians and Ukrainians (Gajdoš, Konečný, 2017, 2018) ideology and politics of education of ethnic minorities in the period of undemocratic political regimes on the territory of Slovakia, a fascist one in 1939 – 1945 and a communist one in 1945 – 1953 (Gabzdilová, Ďurkovská, 2016; Olejník, 2018; Gabzdilová, 2018), and the usage of the Hungarian language in the Slovakized city of Košice (Sáposová, Jeleňová, 2019). The project “**Tendencies of development of ethnic relations in Slovakia – a comparative research of ethnic issues in the years 2004 – 2020**” solved by our interdisciplinary project team constituted a sequel to a pilot project on the issue, conducted between 2003 – 2005, and analysed the development of national relations between 2004 and 2016. In addition, it carried out interdisciplinary empirical research focused on the main theoretical, methodological and practical issues of ethnicity and national relations.

In accordance with the EU pro-Roma agenda and politics of anti-discrimination, researchers put emphasis on the **research of the Roma minority**, specifically in the city of Košice and its Roma ghetto Luník IX. The research team of the project “Luník IX – the Roma housing estate” contributed largely to clarifying the social reproduction of this Roma ghetto, as well as its well-recognized status of a symbol in anti-gypsyist discourse (Filčák, Ficeri, 2021). In connection with Luník IX studies and their societal impact, another team within the Interreg project [DREAM ROAD](#) developed a “**Learning Lab**” for enhancing digital literacy among the local Roma populace.

In this evaluation period, a long-term relationship of cooperation with Ukrainian partners from Uzhhorod brought the elaboration of an innovative project “**Through innovations to effective cooperation**”. Within this project, the research team published recommendations and suggestions for enhancing effectivity of cross-border cooperation between Slovakia and Ukraine with the aim to reduce existing barriers to cross-border cooperation, including the elaboration of a model projection of its institutionalization along the lines of effective Nordic cooperation. During the implementation of the project a new cooperation with the Barents Secretariat in Kirkenes and the representatives of City Kirkenes and Municipality of Finmark in Norway was established. Thanks to this cooperation, a new project started in 2020 called “[CEEAA - Cities in the Enlarged European Area](#)” which is implemented in cooperation with the cities Uzhhorod, Kharkiv, Košice and the Norwegian Research Centre - NORCE.

A special focus was also placed on the **Slovak minority in Hungary**. Long-term cooperation with the Research Institute of Slovaks in Békes Csaba, Hungary brought fruitful outcomes by means of several projects, focused on the one side on language-communicative behaviour of the Slovak youth in Alföld, Hungary, and on the other on current issues of the Slovak minority education and schooling in Hungary (Ďurkovská, Kentoš, 2021; Ďurkovská, Heldáková, Výrost, 2021). This research responds to the current trends of research in social sciences and humanities by connecting inter-disciplinary methods with the aim to emphasize the importance of Slovak minority education in Hungary, the current state of which is difficult, and the quality of which is dependent on the maintenance of the future generation of minority Slovak identity in Hungary.

In the thematic area **Climate change, energy and environment** we have focused on climate change in its economic-social dimensions, developing forecasts and foresights and development strategies on energy, decarbonisation and the transition to a low-carbon and circular economy. (Baláž, Dokupilová & Filčák, 2021; Filčák 2021a; Filčák 2021b; Baláž et al., 2020; Filčák et al. 2020; Filčák & Jeck, 2020; Dokupilová & Filčák 2019; Slovák, Filčák & Dokupilová, 2019; Filčák, Baláž &

Jeck, 2018; Filčák, 2017; Adamec et al. 2017; Baboš et al. 2016; Dokupilová & Filčák, 2016; Baláž, Nežinský, Jeck & Filčák 2020; Filčák & Lubyová, 2016). We have linked research on poverty and the environment to study aspects of environmental justice as an integral part of addressing the weak progress of Slovakia in terms of inclusion and integration of vulnerable groups, especially marginalised Roma communities (Dokupilová & Filčák, 2021; Filčák & Ficeri 2020; Filčák, Szilvasi & Škobla 2018).

The negative development of global growth **due to the pandemic** and the need to reverse it are currently drawing attention to **measures that would bring a recovery and reduce uncertainty in growth forecasts**. The focus of measures is mainly on stimulating consumption, which can reverse negative growth development. As a result of economic growth caused mainly by consumption in recent decades, environmental costs have risen enormously, whether in the form of resource depletion, environmental pollution or climate change. These are the facts which are not recognised sufficiently. The research in this field focused on capturing the shift away from the dynamics of growth towards a more complex approach integrating the quality of growth, especially in the field of environmental sustainability and climate change. Emission efficiency was further embedded in the broader framework of “beyond GDP” development assessment. The social component of development was simply represented by the indicator of income inequality, which is, however, empirically associated with other indicators of social well-being. An examination of the growth factors of the eco-productivity of European economies has shown an inverted U-shaped dependence of the effect of shifting the technological frontier on the income inequality index. (Fifeková & Nežinský & Nemcová & Studená, 2021).

The Industry 4.0 and circular economy have been researched as specific topics which emerged from economic policy prioritization requiring new forecasting and foresight approaches across multiple economic sectors. In the context of the challenges of the 4th Industrial Revolution, attention was focused mainly on the automotive industry, which in several member countries, including Slovakia, is one of the key drivers of their economic growth. Despite the fact that the economic crisis in 2008 revealed the risk of the economy's dependence on one dominant sector, the situation repeated itself after the outbreak of the pandemic in 2020. The COVID-19 pandemic and a related severe lockdown hit the automotive sector of several EU countries, especially CEEC. Although both production and exports rose again in the summer months, due to the threat of subsequent pandemic waves a sustainable recovery is in doubt. For a successful restart of the automotive industry, it will need to adapt its product parameters and marketing strategies to new trends in demand, technology, and business model development (Nemcová & Fifeková, 2020).

Another dominant research focus links forecasting to **demographic changes**. Theoretical and conceptual problems of forecasting focused on integrating and responding to a dramatic change of the demographic development in Slovakia. Our research focused on forecasting models taking into consideration issues of population development at the national and regional level (Bleha et al. 2018; Šprocha et al. 2019), families and households, family and reproductive behaviour and some specifically defined population groups (labour force, urban and rural population, population of the largest cities in Slovakia, people living in Roma communities, e.g., Szabó et al. 2021; Šprocha & Bleha 2018, 2021; Šprocha et al. 2017).

Further, **labour market and human capital** have been intensively researched **as the key factors of social and economic development**. Research on the key trends and current and future developments of the Slovak labour market created strong research evidence on a wide range of issues, including general labour market trends, skills shortages, forecast and forecast methods (Lubyová & Štefánik 2016, 2017, Štefánik & Karasová-(Moravčíková) 2018, Studená 2017, Rublíková & Karasová 2017; Moravčíková & Baláž, 2020 etc.). Research in the area of labour market and skills also included development of different quantitative assessments methods for evaluation of the effectiveness of active labour market policies which represent one of the key instruments for labour market integration. (Karasová, Baláž & Polačková, 2019; Štefánik, Karasová & Studená 2019). Relatedly, research on lifelong learning aimed at assessing the role of lifelong

learning in developing a productive, efficient, and competitive economy. This was done through investigating multiple dimensions of what determines the participation of adults in lifelong learning. The researchers developed a model for assessing what learning potential and innovation ability exists within workplaces, and what organizational models favour innovation ability and innovative oriented training.

During the evaluation period considerable attention was focused on the issue of **migration and migrants**, which is a cross-cutting theme across the Centre's institutes. It has been studied from different perspectives but has enhanced national and international understanding of migration decisions, attitudes towards migrants or regulatory frameworks in specific forms of intra-EU mobility, such as posting of workers. In connection with the growing migration, the research (Baláž & Nežinský & Williams, 2021) focused also on how terrorist attacks and high inflows of immigrants' impact public attitudes towards immigrants from outside the EU. However, the 2015 migration crisis had a significant, greater and more sustained impact on attitudes towards immigrants than terrorist attacks. The research assumes that limited experience with the migrant population was behind hostile attitudes towards immigrants in the post-communist countries. The next set of studies examined **attitudes towards migrants in the Slovak Republic as well as in the European context** (Kentoš, Výrost, 2019; Bozogáňová, Piterová, 2020). In an effort to reflect the current social situation in the form of emphasizing the topic of populism, researchers also dealt with this phenomenon. The aim is to contribute to the understanding of populist attitudes of ordinary people through the application of knowledge and theory offered by social psychology (Piterová, Kováčová - Holevová, Loziak, 2021; Piterová, Heldáková, Kohoutová, 2021) and to find related variables that explain populist attitudes and support for populist parties in Slovakia.

Slovakia is one of the EU countries with strong brain drain, and therefore research focused on **student migration and loss of human capital**. Research on international youth mobility focused on international youth mobility in Europe, and their key characteristics, approaching international mobility as personal and professional development strategies, analyzing the individual outcomes in terms of both employability and careers (skills and competences) and non-economic terms (welfare and identities), analyzing the territorial outcomes for the regions of both origin and destination and differentiating between short-term and long-term outcomes, taking into account return migration and future intentions to migrate (Baláž & Williams, 2018; Baláž, Williams & Chrančoková 2018, Baláž, Chrančoková & Karasová, 2017, Baláž, Williams et al. 2021).

Research on **posting of workers** developed insights into the recent practice of firms in specific sectors within the EU (construction and automotive), and the posted worker flows when providing service in another EU Member State, thus contributing to an understanding of the common European labour market challenges and developments. We mapped the gaps between the EU and national legislative and regulatory frameworks and practice in the posting of workers from the perspective of employers and the challenges in specific sectors of the economy (Kováčová, Mýtna Kureková, Studená 2021). The research was based on multi-stakeholder involvement, and had a direct societal impact by means of establishment of a Platform for labour migration and posting of workers, as well as multiple exchanges with public officials and social partners during the project duration.

The researchers of the Centre were active in several **international research networks** providing intensive scientific collaboration on different scientific topics in an intercultural framework. The research activities resulted in several cross-cultural publications published in top-tier scientific journals. The scientific importance of these studies is based on the fact that they provide robust, cross-cultural evidence of research phenomena which go beyond limited evidence from local national studies.

2.1.9. Narrative on the most important research outputs of the institute – especially focused on their importance for society (3-5 pages)

The most dominant research outputs are related to **the understanding of human reasoning (and reasoning errors) and how these cognitive errors and biases contribute to epistemically suspect beliefs (ESBs)**. Our research was one of the first to establish the relationship between scientific reasoning, cognitive biases, and ESBs (Čavojová, Šrol & Jurkovič, 2020; Šrol, 2022). Endorsement of ESBs is related to many negative social and health consequences: the prime example is vaccination hesitancy and refusal, which is the topic that we continued to develop from the previous evaluation period. Our earlier works focused on how social and cognitive factors influence people's perception of the risks associated with vaccination (Bašnáková, 2016; Masaryk, 2016), how Slovak parents and pediatricians perceive vaccination (Hatoková & Bašnáková, 2016; Hatoková, Masaryk, & Kénesy Túnyiová, 2018), and what communication strategies pediatricians use to facilitate decision-making about vaccinating one's child (Bašnáková & Hatoková, 2016, 2017; Hatoková & Bašnáková, 2017). Following the earlier more exploratory and qualitative works on this issue, our later research focused on **negative vaccination attitudes** as related to various other pseudo-scientific beliefs and examined primarily the cognitive predictors of such beliefs (e.g., Šrol, Čavojová, & Ballová Mikušková, 2021). Thus, during the pandemic we were well-prepared to contribute to the public debate on this topic and address the fear of a new vaccine and the ways how to communicate the risks and benefits of vaccination – our researchers appeared on the national television program “Experiment”, where they discussed this topic, gave many interviews and helped shape the public debate.

Being at the forefront of examining polarizing and controversial topics in Slovakia, we strived to bring our results to the public and enhance scientific communication, as evidenced also by our increase of popularization activities and visibility of the Institute. **The importance of clear communication of scientific findings** fully transpired during the COVID-19 pandemic, when researchers from our Institute dominated the public discourse in regard to epistemically suspect beliefs about the virus and vaccination (conspiracy theories, hoaxes, disinformation). Our colleagues received recognition for these efforts from the Slovak Academy by winning prizes for the popularization activities (Maria Hatoková in 2017 for her work in vaccination hesitancy and Vladimíra Čavojová in 2020 for her work on disinformation and ESBs).

Our efforts in the domain of **recognition of real news from disinformation, bullshit, and other kinds of ESBs** were recognized also by policy-makers and public sector. For example, we were asked to provide consultation to the Security Council of the Government Office (2020, 2021). We also collaborated with the civic association Vivat Vero on creating a web-based application “Antivýtrus”, which would help people to distinguish the disinformation from the real news. Our results on conspiracies and hoaxes were used in the political programme of one political party for the national election. These results did not have only a theoretical impact on the field of psychology, but they were readily applicable when the pandemic of COVID-19 started in 2020. The study of ESBs beliefs focused on conspiracy and pseudoscientific beliefs about COVID-19 and the results achieved a much higher scientific and societal impact. We published 7 papers from this research and one of them (Šrol, Ballová Mikušková & Čavojová, 2021) is among WOS's highly cited papers (top 1% in citations in a given discipline). The paper helped to understand the emotional predictors of COVID-19 conspiracy beliefs at the beginning of the pandemic in Slovakia.

The research on ethnic minorities, their demographic and linguistic characteristics, historical and political development and their social status within a national state and majority society is one of the focuses of the CSPS. The significance of the minority studies in Slovakia results from the geopolitical position and historical development of this multi-ethnic country in Central Europe, and since 2004 within the structures of the EU. Ethnic heterogeneity and stratification of the society generates differing, and often antagonistic perspectives on solving societal problems and concepts of state politics of minorities. Minority rights and the debate on the extent of participation of

minorities in decision-making processes within the national state is a discussed and often conflicting point of societal discourse in Slovakia. Several publications of the CSPA contributed much to the debate to the benefit of appeasing rivaling standpoints (Ficeri, 2019; Ficeri ed., 2019; Ďurková, Šutaj & Regináčová, 2020). An extensive research of the biggest national minority in Slovakia, the Hungarian one, was carried out by several scientists of the Centre (Heldáková, 2020; Šutaj, Šutajová, 2020; Szeghy-Gayer, 2022; Gabzdilová, 2017) by means of analysis of the nodal points of the 20th century and analysis of the current state of inter-ethnic relations. National identity of Jews in the first half of the 20th century in urban milieus of east Slovak provincial cities was analyzed by Veronika Szeghy-Gayer (2020), and the same author collaborated on documenting the collection of the Jewish Museum in Prešov (2021). In relation to the above mentioned comparative research on ethnic minorities, the main aim was a comparison of current inter-ethnic relations using the results of the research carried out by the CSPA between 2003 – 2005. The project team had an ambition to clarify not only the recent development in perception of inter-ethnic relations and politics of minorities, but also to analyse historical circumstances which affected this perception and resulted in changes of attitude. The inter-disciplinary team succeeded in clarifying the societal position of minorities in the majority society. The outcomes of the project with its comparative dimension and historical perspective drew the attention of state authorities such as the Chancellery of the President of the Slovak Republic, experts, and representatives of diplomatic missions of the Slovak Republic, and, as such, it gained an award from the Slovak Academy of Sciences for its considerable scientific significance. In the project, an interdisciplinary team composed of sociologists, psychologists, demographers and historians analyzed the politics of ethnicity, public discourse on ethnicity and nationalism (Šutaj, Šutajová, 2020a, 2020b), as well as inter-ethnic relations among the ethnically-heterogeneous population of Slovakia, which was based on empirical data from a sample of 1,280 respondents of eight different ethnic identities. Based on the analysis of demographic, geographical, historical and psychological factors, the chosen approach enabled to differentiate nuances in answers of the respective respondents. In contrast to opinion polls and other simpler questionnaires, the researchers succeeded in the comparison of constant factors such as age, gender, home address, ethnicity, with other variables such as opinions on the future of Slovak – Hungarian relations, attitudes to political parties, the relationship to administrative divisions of the republic, attitudes to significant historical nodal points, such as a problem of injustice of the current national borders, but also the relationship to regions, regionalism, states (Slovakia, Hungary, etc.), perception to particularism, and universalism. Last, but not least, the project by itself constitutes a theoretic-methodological premise for a creation of policy papers and further research in ethnic studies, as well as possible forecasting of inter-ethnic relations (<https://apvv-projekt7.webnode.sk/>). The publishing of the research results mainly in the Slovak language was intentional, as these are supposed to be applied by state authorities, public sector, self-governing bodies, educational institutions, students, and the public.

Inter-disciplinary research within the Centre, international cooperation, experience exchange and know-how in expert public policing production aimed at municipalities and other organizations are currently used in the project of the EEA Grants titled “Cities in the Enlarged European Area: **Joint Development of Capacities of Public Institutions by Slovak-Ukrainian Cross-border Cooperation and Improving Integrity in Public Affairs CEEA**”. The CSPA as one of the leading expert partners in the Carpathian Region, by means of its affiliated branch based in Košice, and due to its long-term cooperation with the partner city of Uzhhorod, Ukraine, aims in this project at activities in the sphere of innovative social and green cities, and climate change, as well as demographic change, increasing social inequalities and other global mega-trends that require local interventions. The project team composed from an international group of experts (Slovakia, Ukraine, Norway) focuses on identifying examples of good practice (a publication “[A dozen examples of good practice: successful practice in partner cities](#)”), and on the creation of recommendations for respective municipalities aimed at achieving a more just and green society in the context of the European Green Deal. At the end of the project, a huge contribution of the project is expected to be the acceptance of action plans for respective cities focused on the

principles of the circulating and social economy (the cities of Košice, Uzhhorod, Kharkiv). The stated aim of the project is gaining an even larger significance due to the current war situation in Ukraine.

The multidisciplinary team of researchers is increasingly strengthening its position as one of the leaders in identifying **global challenges** and proposing strategic solutions for economic and social policies in Slovakia. The team of academic experts combines academic research with practice. The Forecasting Institute seeks to promote an efficient **design and delivery of public policies** based on data and quality information and supporting and influencing the public debate at international, regional and national levels.

The CSPS SAS is therefore increasingly recognised at the top policy level, but also by other policy stakeholders, as a key expert organisation which is being regularly asked to take part in expert working groups and, especially, to participate in drafting the policy documents based on the CSPS SAS research outputs. Strong expertise has been developed in the production of climate change foresights, strategic documents relevant for future skills foresights (e.g., Lifelong Learning Strategy -30), social cohesion, social economy and inclusion policies.

In the evaluated period, CSPS researchers provided analysis of the state of implementation of the Partnership Agreement of the Slovak Republic 2014 - 2020 and the contribution of the ESIF in the implementation of the European Union strategy to ensure smart, sustainable, and inclusive growth. A progress report on the Implementation of the Partnership Agreement as a prerequisite for the Progress Report of the Slovak Republic in 2019 was delivered. The Partnership Agreement of the Slovak Republic covers all support from the European Structural and Investment Funds of the EU. It is a document that defines the strategy, priorities, and conditions of the Slovak Republic to use these funds in an efficient and effective way in order to achieve the priorities of the Europe 2020 strategy. The CSPS research team has developed an expert evaluation of the Partnership Agreement and the progress achieved in its implementation with respect to the Europe 2020 strategy goals and national strategies. The evaluation reflected on the needs, challenges, and progress in meeting the objectives.

Climate foresights and scenarios are another strong area of research with a direct impact on the policy level and societal progress in Slovakia. Long term cooperation with the Ministry of Environment generated direct outputs for the decision makers, starting first with a technical and quantitative analysis of the current provision and financing of measures in the area of adaptation of the Slovak Republic to the adverse consequences of climate change. Then, secondly, qualitative analyses of requirements and technical and structural barriers to the implementation of adaptation measures by key stakeholders were prepared. The main output was a research report (Bases and recommendations for the preparation of the Action Plan for the implementation of the Strategy for Adaptation of the Slovak Republic to the Adverse Consequences of Climate Change) and two technical annexes focused on prioritizing measures, monitoring and indicators. The project in 2019 is followed by the elaboration of the Action Plan itself, using the methods of participatory and strategic decision-making. The CSPV SAS will also coordinate this phase and the cooperation with the Ministry of the Environment of the Slovak Republic will continue.

A specific area of research has been focused on addressing the failures of Slovakia to improve its approach and results in the area of **inclusion of marginalised and disadvantaged groups** and communities. Within this area a methodology and impact assessment of the EU cohesion policies on Marginalised Roma Communities (Outputs Analyses and Forecasting) was developed. Methodology and Impact Assessment of the EU Cohesion Policies on Marginalised Roma Communities: Outputs Analyses and Forecasting.

Important share of research focused on the **work migration**, and more specifically on the labour flows based, but not limited, to the posting of workers was to examine the differences between legislation and practical experience in posting workers, to identify challenges, to develop and share effective solutions with posting employers and other actors. The research carried out by the CSPV

team yielded a number of key findings, on the basis of which recommendations for application practice were developed. The main findings include: a) limited access of Slovak employers to information on obligations and working conditions in the countries to which workers are posted; (b) problems in determining the level of wages for posted workers; (c) the limited capacity of public institutions, which leads to administrative obstacles and delays in posting workers. The research also pointed to the urgent need to further deepen research in the field of labour migration and the need to specifically address the issue of conditions for workers from third countries.

2.3. Research status of the institute in international and national context

- International/European position of the institute

2.3.1. List of the most important research activities demonstrating the international relevance of the research performed by the institute, incl. major projects (details of projects should be supplied under Indicator 2.4). - **International study on meta-norms: Cross-cultural study in 57 countries.** International research activities focusing on a range of questions about how meta-norms vary between different kinds of sanctions, different situations, different individuals within a country, and different cultures, and what cultural values and norms may underlie these variations. Main coordinator Stockholm University, supported by Swedish Foundation for Humanities and Social Sciences
- **Cross-national study on communal orientation in men (UCOM),** in which 133 researchers from 79 institutions from all over the world are participating. As social scientists, we believe that men's relatively lower involvement in care-oriented roles is best understood in the context of cultural norms, values, and beliefs that can vary across nations. Main coordinators are Katharina Block from the University of Amsterdam, Maria I. T. Olsson from Inland Norway University of Applied Sciences, Toni Schmader from the University of British Columbia and Colette Van Laar from the Center for Social and Cultural Psychology, University of Leuven.
- **Antecedents and consequences of COVID-19 conspiracy beliefs.** 13 researchers from 11 institutions to work on the review of research on conspiracy theories about COVID-19. The project was led by Valerie van Mulukom from Coventry University and even preprints of the collaboration paper received a lot of recognition.
- **Cooperation with researchers from Vienna University.** Senior researchers from our institute supervised various projects concerning cognitive predictors of epistemically suspect beliefs and (dis)information processing and sharing. This cooperation with young researchers has led to some international publications (Čavojová, Secara, Jurkovič, Šrol, 2020; Čavojová & Ersoy, 2020).
- **Study on individual differences in susceptibility to cognitive biases.** Since 2018 we have collaborated on a project with Wim De Neys at the University of Paris. The project dealt specifically with whether people are sensitive to misleading intuitions during reasoning. The project resulted in a publication in a prestigious journal *Thinking & Reasoning* (Šrol & De Neys, 2021).
- **Research on factors of medical rescuers' achievement in work.** The research is realized in cooperation with Dr. Peter Gröpel from Department of Applied Psychology: Work, Education, and Economy, University of Vienna, Austria, and it provides evidence of effective learning of key medical rescuers' skills in simulated situations.
- **COVID - RAPID. Three studies coordinated by the Psychological Science Accelerator (PSA) with an involvement of researcher teams from 89 countries.** The first study tested how message framing impacts people's willingness to participate in social distancing. The manuscript was published in [PNAS](#). [The second study](#) focused on the effectivity of cognitive reappraisal interventions. The third of the PSA's studies examined the effects of loss aversion and negativity bias on the adoption of protective health behaviors (*will be published in Affective Science*).
- **Creative destruction approach.** To examine how alternative design and hypothesis choices affect generalizability and replicability of the results, two studies coordinated by INSEAD have been conducted. *A creative destruction approach to replication: Implicit work and sex morality across cultures* - the study tested the Implicit puritanism theory across varying replication conditions. The paper was published in [Journal of Experimental Social psychology](#). *Creative destruction in science* - the study tested how conceptually and methodologically different tests of multiple theories affect the findings in the fields of work morality, bias reasoning, and gender discrimination. The paper was published in [Organizational Behavior and Human Decision Processes](#).

- **Measuring Internet Gaming Disorder and Gaming Disorder:** A Qualitative Content Validity Analysis of Validated Scales. In collaboration with Matti Karhulahti from the University of Jyväskylä, we examined the content validity of the items/measures measuring (internet) gaming disorder. The manuscript was published in *Assessment*.
- **Towards gender harmony** - Project supported by HARMONIA 6 grant from the National Science Centre in Poland awarded to Natasza Kosakowska-Berezecka. Led by researchers from the University of Gdansk (Poland) and the University of South Florida (USA), two cross-cultural studies on gender equality have been conducted: *Psychometric Properties and Correlates of Precarious Manhood Beliefs in 62 Nations* ([Bosson et al., 2021](#)) – researchers from 77 institutions located in 62 countries in 13 regions of the world worked on a universal understanding of precarious manhood beliefs. The results are published in the *Journal of Cross-Cultural Psychology*. The second study, *Country-level and individual-level predictors of men's support for gender equality in 42 countries* ([Kosakowska-Berezecka et al., 2020](#)), focused on a cross-cultural examination of both individual- and country-level variables predicted men's collective action intentions to support gender equality. The study was published in the *European Journal of Social Psychology*.

Journal Progress 2016-2021:

Since 2018, the journal has been gradually introducing Open Science practices. We have also introduced the possibility of registered studies. Since 2020, we have been moving to positively motivate authors who follow Open Science practices by visibly informing about articles that share data, materials and / or have been pre-registered. The last two monothematic (2021, 2022) numbers have more than 93% of articles with shared data and / or materials. Since 2018, the journal has also been in the DOAJ database (Directory of Open Access Journals). DOAJ covers approximately 9,000 journals with the OA approach, and aims to increase the visibility and usability of OA journals and thus increase their social impact. In addition to the visibility and easier searchability of the content, being in the DOAJ database also signals that the journal is trustworthy and adheres to the standards required by the DOAJ. We increased the role of international members of the editorial board and hosting editors. Recently, we have published our first special issue edited exclusively by international hosting editors on the Psychological Roots of Questionable Health Practices. All these activities led to an increase of the journal's JCR impact factor from 0.511 in 2016 to 0.953 in 2021.

Journal progress 2016-2021:

In 2017, the multilingual character of the journal was eliminated and articles are published only in English. Since 2019 each article has been assigned a DOI number. The editorial board has been expanded to include experts from abroad, i.e. not only from Central Europe but also from

Northern and Western Europe and overseas. At present, it has 21 members, of which 61.9% are from abroad. The number of authors from abroad has increased, as well as their geographical distribution, and the number of authors from within the institution has decreased (from 41% between 2015-2018 to 6.4% between 2019-2021). The journal follows the principles of Open Science by applying the Level 1 TOP Guidelines and is planning to apply the Level 2 in the future. From 2022 the possibility of Open Science Badges has been introduced, which, by promoting the principles of open science, should help to increase the credibility of articles.

Ekonomický časopis/Journal of Economics is a peer-reviewed journal published since 1952. The journal publishes articles, discussions and analytical studies from the fields of macro and microeconomics theory, economic policies, and quantitative analysis by using econometric models, socio-economic forecasting, corporate management, analysis of the financial sector, cross-sectoral analysis, as well as of regional and social development. The journal addresses thematic areas covering globalisation, European integration, including emerging markets' economies. Currently, the preferred topics are: technological change (4th Industrial Revolution, digitization, robotics / automation and artificial intelligence), climate change and its impact on socio-economic development, long-term sustainability of socio-economic development in the context of Agenda 2030, the process of globalization/deglobalization, global financial stability, macroeconomic development, monetary and fiscal policy, regional development, structural reforms, economic impacts caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, as well as new methodological approaches in economic theory and their applications in economic policy.

- **Psychological aspects of adaptation to retirement** - research focused on identifying personality, social, and cognitive resources and barriers of optimal coping with retirement transition in the Slovak retirees. These projects provide inputs into the process and factors of optimal retirement adaptation in Slovak society, and provide resources for the application of the obtained results in the Slovak social context. In Slovakia, it is a unique project dealing with psychological factors of optimal retirement adaptation. VEGA No. 2/0048/18
- **Promoting Open Science practices.** We were the founding members of the Slovak Reproducibility Network (Community of Open Science) and we launched important collaborative networks with researchers from Slovak Universities (Comenius University, University of Pavol Jozef Šafárik, Trnava University, and Prešov University). We launched the website to promote open science practices and we organize webinars and lectures for young researchers about open science practices, advanced statistics, pre-registration, sharing materials and data, and others. One of the results of our activities is also using badges incentivizing open science practices in our journal *Studia Psychologica* and we are proud to say that the last two Special issues contained more than 90 % of articles that shared data and/or materials. Also the *Individual and Society [Človek a spoločnosť]* journal follows the principles of open science by applying the Level 1 TOP Guidelines. For authors the possibility of Open Science Badges is introduced, which, by promoting the principles of open science, should help to increase the credibility of articles.
- **Popularization of science.** Over the last evaluation period, we have focused intensively on increasing our outreach activities toward the general public. We have given dozens of interviews

to print media, appeared in radio and television discussions, created online presentations and a series of short popularization videos, as well as publicly accessible brochures regarding topics such as unfounded beliefs, scientific reasoning, and vaccine hesitancy. We have collaborated with other institutes of the SAS, as well as with other organizations, such as the Slovak Centre of Scientific and Technical Information. We have also launched a blog of the Institute of Experimental Psychology (<https://dennikn.sk/autor/uepsav/>), and organized a public conference “Why people believe weird things?”. Almost every year, we also join two large Slovak science popularization events: The week of science and technology, and Researchers night with presentations or posters for general public. Our success in popularization of science in Slovakia is evidenced by three of our colleagues who were awarded prizes for popularization of social sciences by the President of the Slovak Academy of Sciences. We always try to promote popularization on current topics and at regular intervals, we are active in podcasts, popularization section titled “Kalendárium” (2021 – we wrote about international days related to science; 2022 - anniversaries of important personalities of science) and publishing news on Facebook and Instagram page. We also popularize our journal via several online platforms (Academia.edu and Facebook, where the journal has its own profile).

- Contribution to **Improving the Quality of Emergency Prehospital Health Care** - CSPS thanks to 12 years of research in the field of naturalistic decision-making, emotions, macrocognitions and key non-technical skills of health professionals represents a pioneer of interdisciplinary research of social and cognitive skills of emergency medical staff in Slovakia and the Czech Republic, which have a fundamental impact on the professional and patient-felt quality of the provided health care. Although it is primarily basic research, its results have been accepted, disseminated and applied by urgent pre-hospital healthcare providers in practice, which leads to increased patient safety, reduced psychological burden on healthcare professionals and overall quality improvement.
- **Hate speech in digital space** - The current and emotive issue of hate speech in digital space has been analysed by Papcunová et al. (2021) in cooperation with professionals in the area of artificial intelligence from Kempelen Institute of Intelligent Technologies (KIIT). The team succeeded in providing an empirical definition of manifestation of hateful conduct by defining 10 indicators of hate speech. A set of quantifying indicators can contribute to tackle hate speech by facilitating its identification, evaluation and enclosure.
- **Application of innovative scholarly approaches with the aim to refute dogmatic interpretations of the past** – CSPS supports operationalization of innovative scholarly approaches in the research of history. Constructivist and post-colonial theories were applied in the case of the monograph Košice Post-Trianon (Ficeri, 2019) which was published on the occasion of the centennial commemoration of the international recognition of the Czechoslovak-Hungarian border by the Peace Treaty of Trianon. Author of the monograph attempted to reconsider some of the ethnocentric interpretation schemes of national historiographies – the Hungarian and Slovak ones. In the course of the 20th century, both historiographies mutually disputed “national character” and geopolitical belonging of the strategic city of Košice/Kassa. A transnational approach applied in the book won a national award for the best scientific opus in the category of social sciences and humanities (Cena Literárneho fondu 2019).
- **Tendencies of development of ethnic relations in Slovakia** - elaboration of extensive analysis of national policy and national relations in Slovakia including historical context of these relations through interdisciplinary oriented empirical research using unique research methodology of national issues based on complex grasp of researched phenomena through application of several social science methods.
- **Ethnically Encoded Sites of Memory** - The research focused on Romany sites of memory, their forms, visualization and remembrance. The aim was to draw attention to Romany sites of memory, and also to record the stories of witnesses (initiators, artists, scientists, i.e. publicly

active and professionally involved persons in the construction and creation of Romany sites of memory, members of both the majority and Romany minority, people tied to Romany sites of memory). The map of the Romany memory was created under the website www.paramisar.eu (Kultminor No. 19-170-02166)

- **Stress of teachers during pandemic** - The COVID-19 pandemic affected many areas of everyday life, including the closure of schools. Many teachers became exposed to an increased burden connected to the online form of education. Some psychologists of the Centre focused therefore on measuring the stress of teachers during the pandemic. The research repeatedly proved the pandemic having been a serious problem in teachers' lives. At the same time, it brought a more precise insight on what problems teachers encountered in that period. The first study (Loziak, Fedáková, Čopková, 2020) published in Journal of Women's Entrepreneurship and Education mapped the burden in the beginning of the pandemic and showed that the increased burden resulted from insecurities and unclear instructions how to deal with the situation from the part of the managing staff and authorities. The second study (Loziak, Fedáková, 2021) focused on measuring the stress in the peak of the pandemic. The study showed not only an increase in the burden, but also how it negatively affected mental and physical health. The third study (Loziak, 2021) identified the most vulnerable groups of teachers during the pandemic, those being the youngest and the least experienced female teachers. Researchers also pointed out that one of the most significant source of the stress among teachers was a lack of societal appreciation. The results of the research were met with a considerable response in the media (Work and Organizational Psychology 2021: Innovation - research and application, [Ako zvládať \(nielen\) učiteľský stres](#), Duševná imunita učiteľov: Konferencia, [Intenzita pracovného stresu učiteľov sa následkom pandémie zvýšila](#), Rádio Regina: O učiteľskom strese a ako sa ho zbaviť).

2.5.7. List of joint research laboratories/facilities with universities

- Training programme “PODNIKNI NIEČO!” (DO SOMETHING!) ran at University Counseling Centre (University of Pavol Jozef Šafárik in Košice) in 2017 and 2018. It was coordinated by Centre of Social and Psychological Sciences (PhD. student Zuzana Kožárová and her supervisor Denisa Fedáková). Training programme DO SOMETHING! consisted of several modules during which students met with entrepreneurs and discussed their ideas with them. They also learned about the financial and legal aspects of entrepreneurship in Slovakia, created a business plan and finally presented it to entrepreneurs who gave them "feedback". In this way, participants developed a startup idea, which allowed them to move more flexibly at the labor market and found it easier to apply. 2.5.8. Supplementary information and/or comments on doctoral studies and educational activities – focused on what changes have occurred since the last evaluation in 2016

During the evaluated period, the CSPA established three new agreements with universities and started new PhD programs in cooperation with Faculty of Arts, Trnava University (programme: general and experimental psychology) and Faculty of Social and Economic Sciences, Comenius University (programme: public politics) and Faculty of National Economy (programme: economy and management).

Moreover, a new strategy for enhancing the quality of PhD studies was adopted. It focuses on the quality of all agents involved in the process of PhD. studies: garant, tutor and student. The content of the strategy is available at the CSPA website.

As a partner institution in the project Horizon 2020 “UrbanHist: History of European Urbanism in the 20th Century” (Marie Skłodowska-Curie grant agreement), CSPA was involved in the process of doctoral candidates preparation. **Jovana Janinović from Montenegro**, was a PhD student under the supervision of prof. Štefan Šutaj with a research project called “Institutionalised historical memory and the city”. In 2017 our Centre organised in Košice a joint meeting of PhD students from the project UrbanHist (students from Poland, France, Montenegro and Czech Republic) and PhD students of our Centre. In the period from October 1, 2018 to December 30, 2018, two PhD students - **Aliksander Shuba from Belarus** (*research project: The historiography of European urbanism in the 20th century*) and **Federico Camerin from Italy** (*research project: Urban Heritage Planning, its Relations to Real-Estate, Economic and Social Models in 20th Century*) implemented their research stay at the Centre in Košice.

Epistemically suspect beliefs: From the fringe to the mainstream

- *Summary of the impact:* Our research on epistemically suspect beliefs (ESBs) started in 2015 and since then it has gained momentum and visibility among the scientific community and wider public. We organised and were invited to several talks with the general public, and have published books and leaflets (Open Academy). We created several measurement tools that are used by the Slovak scientific community and established the research of epistemically suspect beliefs and bullshit, as well as their cognitive predictors, firmly in the Slovak setting. Moreover, since the start of the pandemic in early 2020 it has become clear that ESBs are not limited to the fringes of society (and research), but to the mainstream, and our work has gradually gained a lot of attention from the media and policy-makers.
- *Underpinning research:* Our work is rooted in the study of rationality and newer dual-process models (e.g. Stanovich, 2011; de Neys & Pennycook, 2019). First of all, we focused on identifying the best way to measure ESBs. Usually, these consist of three types of beliefs: belief in conspiracy theories, paranormal beliefs, and pseudo-scientific beliefs, which up until only recently (Lobato et al., 2014) have been studied separately. We developed and published several new instruments to study culturally specific conspiracy beliefs (Ballová Mikušková, 2018) and all three types of ESBs (Halama, 2019), and our research group was among the first to study cognitive predictors of all three types of ESBs (Čavojová et al., 2020; Šrol, 2022). These studies contributed to our understanding that scientific reasoning predicted the endorsement of ESBs over and above analytical thinking and may represent an important protective factor against unfounded beliefs (Čavojová et al., 2020). The main contribution of our theoretical findings emerged after the onset of the pandemic in early 2020. We were able to utilize our previous knowledge and create a new measure of ESBs regarding COVID-19 (mostly conspiracy theories and pseudo-scientific beliefs) and not only verified the existential threat model of endorsement of conspiracy theories (Šrol et al., 2021) but also pointed to various health (Čavojová et al., 2022) and social consequences (Šrol et al., 2022) of holding these kinds of unfounded beliefs.

Details of the impact:

RECOGNIZING RELIABLE INFORMATION – Educating public about recognizing reliable information from disinformation and understanding the innate biases of our minds that lead to inclination to accept disinformation and unfounded beliefs, especially when they fit people’s preexisting beliefs and biases. Our pre-pandemic results had a societal impact in the form of early recommendations on how to distinguish disinformation and hoaxes about COVID-19 that were published on our website early in the pandemic and this has led to a series of interviews and media coverage with more general advice regarding pseudoscientific practices and informational literacy. (Our media presence doubled in 2020-2021 in comparison with the previous period.)

EDUCATION – Many of our popularization efforts lead to collaboration with educators and NGOs focusing on educating critical thinking. We gave several lectures and workshops in secondary schools, introducing science to younger children (All4Science, Vedecký brloh, etc.), summer festivals (Drienok, Pohoda), or general public. We were invited by Edulab NGO to participate in creating their online course “Critical Thinking”, which has become one of the most successful online courses.

RESPONSIBLE SHARING OF INFORMATION – Our expertise was also used in the campaign of telecommunication operator O2 during summer 2021 “Use data responsibly: Bring back reason to internet”: <https://datujzodpovedne.o2.sk/>. We participated in creating the short quiz measuring whether people can recognize disinformation. Similarly, we were invited to another project by NGO Vivat Vero, which was developing an online tool Antivýtrus to mark suspicious information.

OPEN SCIENCE – All our scientific findings as well as the whole materials and data sets were shared at public websites for pre-prints and at Open Science Framework (osf.io). This helped to spread our visibility also in the international scientific community and lead to receiving invitations for collaborations.

Scientific reasoning as protection against disinformation

- *Summary of the impact*: Scientific reasoning was shown to represent a protective factor against various kinds of ESBs (Čavojová et al., 2020), but focusing on its enhancement is a rather long-term endeavor. However, based on our research activities, we were able to form partnerships with other organizations that promote scientific literacy and engagement in science among school-age children, and thus get results-based practices among a wider public.
- *Underpinning research*: Scientific reasoning is one of the components of scientific literacy (together with science knowledge and attitudes to science), but until recently, it received little attention as the majority of research focuses on scientific knowledge or trust in science. Our research validated a new measure of scientific reasoning on a sample of Slovak adults (Bašňáková et al., 2021). Moreover, we also verified the assumption that when faced with real-life scientific problems, people do not necessarily apply decontextualized knowledge of methodological principles, but reason from the bottom up, i.e. by predominantly relying on heuristics based on what they already know or believe about the topic. Our results enabled an important insight into how people who are “naive” to the scientific method solve problems that require scientific reasoning. We were also able to show that scientific reasoning skills predict people’s susceptibility to ESBs and cognitive biases (Čavojová et al., 2020). Most importantly, scientific reasoning is a significant predictor, contributing to susceptibility to both cognitive biases and ESBs over and above all the other cognitive predictors. Also during the pandemic, scientific reasoning was a better predictor of COVID-19 related ESBs than analytical thinking, but the lack of a clear pattern of correlations with the actual health behavior suggested that it serves as a protective factor against acquiring unsubstantiated beliefs, which seem to be the strongest predictor of less than recommended health practices (Čavojová & Ersoy, 2020). These results provided the first empirical evidence that scientific reasoning ability is an important factor in protecting against ESBs and in aiding better decision-making among the non-scientific population.

Details of the impact:

INTERDISCIPLINARY COLLABORATION – One of the practical impacts of our research on scientific reasoning has been starting of the collaboration with other institutes at the Slovak Academy of Sciences, as well as outside the academia. We joined the project “Find the scientist in yourself” organized by six institutes of the Slovak Academy of Sciences (Institute of Materials and Machine Mechanics, Polymer Institute, Institute of Chemistry, Institute for Heart Research, Institute of Experimental Pharmacology & Toxicology - Centre of Experimental Medicine SAS). We were mostly responsible mostly for evaluating the effects of the project activities on the scientific reasoning and attitudes to the science of the pupils that engaged in the project.

EDUCATION – Our work has led to several outreaching activities, such as participating in the Science summer school organized by All4Science, collaborating with Edulab (educational NGO) on creating Phenomena of the World (Part: Human) and Edulab Academy (course of critical thinking for the teachers), and several lectures and debates for and with the public.

CREATIVE SCIENCE – Together with the partners from the six institutes of SAS, we applied for funding for our project Systematic program for complex knowledge and critical thinking by experiential learning of science that in 2021 received funding from the Ministry of Education, Science, Research, and Sport of the Slovak Republic. The results of this project will have direct effects on the education of elementary school children in science subjects (physics, technical education, biology, and chemistry) and are presented under the label “Creative science” (kreativnaveda.sk).

Measuring social attitudes and changes in Europe - European Social Survey

- *Summary of the impact:* The European Social Survey (ESS) is an international survey that has been conducted every two years in more than 30 European countries since 2001. The National ESS team (CSPS team) has been coordinating the ESS activities in Slovakia since 2004. The main objectives are: 1) to monitor stability and changes in the social structure, living conditions and attitudes of Europeans and to interpret the social, political and value transformations of Europe's population; 2) to provide validated indicators of development at national level, based on citizens' views on key elements of society; 3) to achieve and disseminate higher methodological standards of research in international social science, concerning, for example, questionnaire design and pre-testing, sampling of respondents, data collection, reliability of questions and reduction of bias; 4) to undertake and support the training of social researchers in international quantitative measurement and analysis; 5) to promote data and their impact on social change among academics, policy makers and the wider public. In 2013, ESS became a European Research Infrastructure Consortium (ERIC) as an excellent science project. The Slovak Republic has been a full member of the ESS ERIC Consortium since 2018.
- *Underpinning research:* Every two years, empirical data collection is carried out on representative samples of the populations of the participating countries using a standard methodology of about 300 questions, which consists of two parts: 1.) the core module contains items that are steadily repeated in order to analyze trends; 2.) the rotating modules are specific and their inclusion in the questionnaire is decided by the project's scientific board in a competition of international teams. The ESS topics cover a wide range of issues, such as civic participation and the perception of democracy, family and working life, personal and social well-being, attitudes towards ageing, trust in social institutions, and attitudes towards climate change. The databases of the ESS rounds that were carried out are freely accessible to all interested parties. During the evaluated period the CSPS team produced and delivered a Slovak representative dataset for Round 9 and coordinated fieldwork for Round 10. Undertaking ESS Round 10 in Slovakia has been very challenging due to the pandemic. Slovakia was one of the few countries to conduct face-to-face research despite the limitations associated with Covid-19.

Details of the impact:

The ESS data is available free of charge for non-commercial use and can be downloaded from the ESS website. The ESS is primarily intended for the academic community. However, ESS data are also used by the European Commission, the European Parliament, the governments of the participating countries, Eurostat and the countries' statistical offices as a source of information for policy formulation at different levels of government. The ESS has a knowledge transfer programme directly to policy makers and has held seminars at the European Parliament, some national parliaments, the OECD, the European Commission and other institutions.

Sources to corroborate the impact:

Thematic issues of each ESS Round facilitate further utilisation of the data by scholars, as well as decision makers in creation of social policies. At the same time, they provide reliable sources for the media. According to the latest update the number of registered users in Slovakia up to January 2022 reached 552.

Mine closure and decarbonisation at Upper Nitra, Slovakia

- *Summary of the impact:* The political debate on the cost and benefits of the coal mining in Upper Nitra has been going on with various intensity from the early 1990s, when economic transformation from a centrally planned economy for free market began. The decision to phase out coal mining in Upper Nitra has been made in 2018 and the mine will be definitely closed in 2023. The discussion is now focused on policies, activities and steps in the transition. CSPS has been involved in the process from 2018 in various research capacities focused on social and economic aspects of the transformation. From 2020 is CSPS part of an international project supported by H2020 "Aspects of the social sciences and humanities in the transition to clean energy" and focuses on "the challenges facing carbon-intensive regions." multi-context framework: 1) decarbonisation policies; 2) ongoing processes of de-territorialisation; and 3) the territorial dimension of the transition to clean energy. The following contextual elements defined in the project will then provide data and information for the interpretation of the main research questions: a) The risks of coal closure and transformation of regions with a high share of carbon consumption can have different impacts. Along with these processes, conflicts also emerge, shifting from the local to the national and European levels and vice versa.
- *Underpinning research:* The main focus of the project is the analysis of these conflicts and the negotiation processes that concern them, as well as the context of public policies and political culture shaping the course and intensity of conflicts; (b) The challenges facing coal and carbon-intensive regions are being examined on the basis of an ongoing process at territorial level. Another line of project implementation is to identify deterritorialization factors operating in different coal and carbon-intensive regions and to analyze and explain their dynamics and interactions; c) The transition to clean energy cannot be understood only as a technological change or an industrial shift and must therefore be analyzed as a socio-economic-psychological process affecting the lives of local communities. In this regard, the project aims to study process management strategies from a wide range of perspectives: a multidimensional perspective combining different disciplinary frameworks; comparative perspective, elaboration of a comprehensive set of case studies; a multilevel perspective involving various key actors at territorial, regional, national, European and global levels. Each of these strategies will be developed in a specific research segment: Theoretical Area, Analytical Part and Proactive Area.

Details of the impact:

The CSPS has been actively involved in decarbonisation strategies debates with the Ministry of Regional Development and Investments. Our reports were used in the development of the Action Plan for Transformation of the Upper Nitra Region adopted by the Slovak government. As part of the research, 2 research reports were prepared in 2021 (socio-economic analysis of the Upper Nitra and Socio-political analysis of the decarbonization transformation process). The first outputs of the project were also used in economic practice in cooperation with the decision-making sector.

Authors of the reports were involved in the development of Operational Programme Slovakia, the main strategic document for planning and distribution of the European Structural and Investments Funds and in the planning process focused on capacity building of key stakeholders in Upper Nitra.

Luník IX – genesis and social reproduction of the Roma ghetto

- *Summary of the impact:* Our research on the genesis and social reproduction of the Roma ghetto Luník IX (Košice, Slovakia) began a gradual process of de-stigmatization of this racially segregated urban district which in the course of its existence became a metonym for the failed Roma assimilation and anti-Roma sentiment in Slovakia and beyond. We organized a series of presentations for governing bodies and the general audience at which we stressed the nature of structural racism as a primary cause of the Roma discrimination throughout the European continent. We promoted public activities taking place directly in the public space of the district, creating a sense of mutual belonging with segregated inhabitants. At the same time, we reported on the significance of the district in the domestic as well as foreign public discourse, e. g. during the visit of Pope Francis (2021), as the district represents a symbol of racial conflict, prejudices and social inequality.
- *Underpinning research:* Despite being a frequently debated phenomenon of domestic as well as foreign public discourse, Luník IX stands on the sidelines of a scholarly inquiry. We attempted to embed the genesis and further social reproduction of the district into the theories of racial segregation

and ghettoization (Vaquant, 2009) and critical whiteness studies (Delgado, Stefancic, 1997). In the first stage, utilizing the conceptual and theoretical framework of environmental justice, we focused on the spatial distribution of the adverse environmental effects in relation to social and ethnic factors. The case of Luník IX, with its roots in the period of a centrally planned economy, allowed us to analyze the mechanism of decision-making in an avowedly non-capitalist society, where in reality we see many similarities in how income inequality between richer and poorer neighborhoods, together with ethnic/racial factors, has shaped the city (Filčák, Ficeri, 2021). Another direction of the research was focused on analysis of the phenomenon of Luník IX in historical memory using methods of oral history. Dichotomous narratives on Luník IX mirror antagonism in memories of the majority society on the one side, and the Roma community on the other (Kohoutová, 2020, 2021). We also draw attention to a symbolic gesture done by Pope Francis, who visited the district in 2021. In connection to the visit we analyzed its societal and religious symbolism (Varšo, 2022).

Details of the impact:

SENSITIZATION AND POPULARIZATION – We organized a series of popularization presentations (2019, 2020) aimed at deconstructing numerous myths and prejudices which prevail in mentalities of members of the majority society in regard to the critical housing conditions at Luník IX and asociality of the local inhabitants. Presentations were met with a considerable interest of a general audience. Last but not least it attracted attention of the municipal authorities who manifested interest in producing a popularization publication about the development of the district. Also, a local guide agency came up with an idea of organizing expert tours of the district for outsiders, consulting with us the scenario and details of the tours.

CREATING MUTUAL BELONGING – A research of social reproduction of a ghetto inevitably involves analyzing narratives of both conflicting parts, members of the majority as well as stigmatizing minority. By juxtaposing both narratives in the research outcomes and media coverage alike we contribute to mitigation of a latent ethnic conflict and widespread antigypsyism in Slovakia.

CROSS-SECTORAL COLLABORATION – The phenomenon of Luník IX and numerous attempts to improve socio-cultural conditions and the standard of living of local inhabitants occupy agencies of several national, regional and local stakeholders. Our team jointed a permanent platform for discussion of problems accumulated at the district which was established by the Municipality of Košice. We cooperate on the positive coverage of the district and its inhabitants with national (RTVS) and local media (Korzar). At the same time, we coordinate our activities with the local NGO ETP Slovakia in producing a positive image of the stigmatized district.

2.8. Background and management. Infrastructure and human resources, incl. support and incentives for young researchers

The Center of Social and Psychological Sciences is a significant scientific research organization that profits from its diversity in a) the geographic location of its institutes: in two cities Bratislava and Košice and at three addresses; b) its scientific disciplines: psychology, economy, history; c) the occupational status of its employees: administrative and technical staff, PhD. students, junior & senior researchers; d) the nationality of its employees; e) the age of its employees. Diversity leads us to tolerance and positive relationships in the workplace.

Since the establishment of the Centre there has been a general agreement about the representation of all three institutes in its top management, i.e. director, deputy director and head of scientific board represent one institute each. The Centre's director closely and intensively cooperates with the heads of all three institutes.

The Centre's management aims for a unification of processes across all three institutes. To follow that aim, several guidelines were adopted at the Centre's level: e.g., performance criteria and evaluation, gender policy, human resources policy, environmental policy, homeoffice, and vacation taking.

The Centre's management helps with project administration support via the ethical committee, GDPR policy for data processing. Moreover, the Centre's management encourages and creates conditions for the project and scientific interconnections of the Centre's institutes. The annual meetings of the Centre's employees are excellent events for an exchange of experience, teambuilding and starting new cooperations.

The Centre is an organization that creates conditions for attracting new researchers. Its publication and project activities, facilities and overall working conditions made several researchers apply to work with us. The number of researchers in the Centre increased in the evaluated period thanks to extra budget resources.

In the past years we had two applications for the SASPRO project and two researchers from the Netherlands and Spain were accepted. Unfortunately, their stay was very short due to personal/administrative reasons.

To evaluate the support and incentives we asked young researchers at CSPA for feedback.

They answered that they like the cooperative and supportive team at CSPA and in its Institutes, and also the professional relationships and informal atmosphere. They appreciate the willingness to very actively support the project/publishing challenges of the young researchers and opportunities to participate in running research projects with experienced colleagues, i.e., learning by observing and learning by doing. The young researchers are grateful for the organizing of substantive and methodological seminars with room for discussions and experience exchange, and also the high frequency of possible webinars options or training which are helpful for submitting new projects, writing studies in indexed journals or media and popularization outputs. During their initial stay at the CSPA, an identity and sense of belonging to the it is created which helps young researchers to facilitate continuous improvement and effectiveness in their research and allows them to work alongside the seniors' researchers with their high-quality research projects. They also appreciated the support for applying for extra financial incentives (funds) and they see the inter-disciplinarity at the CSPA as a source of motivation and inspiration.

He also gained the Award of the SAS for scientific popularisation (2018). In his consequent career he followed a path of post-colonial paradigm in ethnic and racial studies. He currently focuses on a touchy problem of the social reproduction of urban and rural Roma ghettos in Slovakia in the context of antigypsyism.

2.8.2.3. Postdoctoral positions from other resources (specify)

The Centre creates conditions for postdoctoral positions from other resources (not only during the evaluated period) in case we see the future potential of these young researchers. The position of psychologist **Matúš Adamkovič** was one of these successful cases – after finishing his PhD in General and Experimental Psychology at the University of Presov (2019), he started working at the Centre. During the first 15 months (from 10/2019) in the Centre he was financed by the financial sources of the ESS project. His research is focused on research methodology, replicability of (behavioral) research, and network approach to psychopathology. He is a co-author of 20 studies published in CCC journals (Nature Human Behaviour, PNAS, Assessment, Complex & Intelligent Systems, PLOS ONE etc.), has about 400 citations, during the last 4 years he completed internships and courses at several foreign institutions (University in Belfast, University of Amsterdam, NHH Bergen, University of Padova, and University of Jyväskylä). He has actively participated in many transnational collaborative studies focused on increasing the replicability and credibility of behavioral research (e.g., the SCORE project - the Center for Open Science and DARPA; and the PSA - the Psychological Science Accelerator platform). In the Centre, he coordinates weekly running statistical and methodological seminars for (not only young) researchers. He is a co-founder of the Slovak Reproducibility Network. In 2022 he became a senior researcher and his participation in an ERC grant with a partner from the University of Jyväskylä starts in August 2022. He is going to be involved in the project under the scheme Horizon Europe. From 2021 his position is paid from the Centre's budget.

The other form of supporting the research positions for young scientists is a compensatory allowance that can be granted in a competition of young successful researchers and as a result of evaluation of the SAS commission. In practice it means 150 EUR bonus to the salary for next two years if the researcher is full-time employed (75 EUR is subsidized by the central budget of the SAS, 75 EUR goes from the Institute budget). The compensatory allowance after successful PhD study obtained two of our young ambitious psychologists - Ivana Piterová (from 01/2020) and Jakub Šrol (from 01/2020). They are both very successful young researchers:

Ivana Piterová - She finished her M.A. in psychology at Pavol Jozef Šafárik University in Košice and earned her PhD in Social Psychology at the same university (joint PhD with CSPS SAS). She focuses on attitudes towards immigrants, welfare attitudes and populist attitudes. She completed several statistical courses (Cambridge in UK, online), is a principal investigator of the

project VEGA 2/0065/21 (Social and psychological correlates of populist attitudes), participates in national and international projects (VEGA 0068, VEGA 0172, ESS, LISPER and BIOFORD). Was involved in international collaborative studies focused on gender equality (mentioned in part 2.3.1), is a member of the EASP and the ESRA, is an executive editor of the journal *Individual and Society*, was awarded by the best poster in the doctoral section at the Conference on Work and Organizational Psychology 2017. She is a co-author of two books (Piterová, I. - Kováčová Holevová, B. - Loziak, A., 2021; Piterová, I. - Heldáková, L. - Kohoutová, K.) and chapters in book (e.g. Európska sociálna sonda: 9. kolo na Slovensku), article in European Journal of Social Psychology, Journal of Cross-Cultural psychology or Intersections: East European Journal of Society and Politics.

Jakub Šrol - He finished his M.A. in psychology at Comenius University in Bratislava. He earned his PhD in Social Psychology at Comenius University in Bratislava in 2016 (joint PhD with the Centre of Social and Psychological Sciences, SAS). He focuses on the study of individual differences in susceptibility to cognitive biases and epistemically suspect beliefs, he also deals with the negative consequences of the adoption of unwarranted beliefs in the domain of social life and health behavior. He has experience in publishing in foreign journals (*Thinking & Reasoning*, *Applied Cognitive Psychology*). His works received 1st place in the international round of the Student Scientific Activities (ŠVOČ) competition, the Comenius University Rector's Award for an excellent diploma thesis, or 3rd place in the competition of young scientists of the SAS. Currently he is a senior researcher at the Centre.

2.8.3. Important research infrastructure introduced during the evaluation period with the information about the sources of funding (max. 2 pages)

During the evaluated period the CSPA has been awarded two European structural and investment funds. For the CSPA it means a great opportunity to cooperate with research, state, and private institutions on subjects of high societal importance. The created consortiums of the projects on Personalized medicine and Biobanking allow us to approach the subjects in the context of technology, medicine, ethics, foresights, and social attitudes aiming to improve citizens' health through innovative diagnostic and therapeutic procedures. In particular, the task of the CSPA within the consortium is modeling demographic trends and societal effects in oncological diagnostic and treatment; the design of regional models for incidence of cancer and projection of national, medical and social effects of early diagnosis and treatment for Slovakia. In the field of Biobanking we aim for the expansion and completion of research and innovation through building a biobanking system for cancer and rare diseases, and its integration into the international net of research infrastructure. Here the CSPA evaluates the socio-economic effects of the future national biobank.

2.9 Supplementary information and/or comments on all items 2.1 – 2.8 (max. 2 pages in total for the whole section)

In the Centre we aim for improving and increasing all the indicators of the main activities. So not only quantity but especially quality is our goal. A combination of history, psychology, and economy under the roof of our Centre enables us to perform research in which we are able to reflect and contribute to the knowledge relevant to the past, present, but also to the future. The inter-disciplinarity in the Centre opens doors to cooperation with other institutes of the SAS (e.g., Institute of Economic Research, Institute of Ethnology and Social Anthropology, Biomedical Research Centre) in research projects and consortiums.

3. Implementation of the recommendations from the previous evaluation period

The management of the CSPA has long taken into account the recommendations of the Panel of Evaluators from the previous accreditation as priorities for organizational development. These include in particular the following priorities:

- increase activity in submitting / obtaining international projects (not only bilateral)
- publish more in world languages
- support inter-disciplinary research (the creation of a CSPV provides the prerequisites for this)
- combine regional and international studies; develop cooperation regionally, etc...
- develop more distant international partners
- enable the mobility of researchers not only from Slovakia to abroad, but also in the opposite direction
- focus publishing magazines on publishing in world languages, pay attention to open access and penetration of results abroad
- establishment of the International Advisory Board and its cooperation with the CSPA

NOTE: The recommendations from the previous accreditation were addressed to the three Institutes of the Centre separately, so that is why here we describe the implementation of them separately.

The previous accreditation brought several recommendations for **the Institute of Experimental Psychology**, which were taken into account in the further development of the institution:

The evaluation panel commented on the lack of international funding. In the new evaluation period, the research staff worked intensively to address this shortcoming in several ways - by establishing further research collaborations with foreign partners, by intensifying cooperation within the center with research teams that are successful in obtaining international funding, and by providing institutional support for researchers seeking to obtain international projects. The result is a number of international projects that have been submitted either in cooperation with other institutions (Horizon 2020 projects) or with the institute as a leading institution (Visegrad Fund). Several of these projects were successful, and they are funded. The researchers of the Institute of Experimental Psychology are currently participating in three international projects. In cooperation with the Institute for Forecasting, we are participating in the international project ENTRANCES H2020. In 2021, we acquired two international projects: Political culture, democratic values and misinformation: Detecting democratic footholds & weaknesses (leading researcher I. Brezina) funded by the Visegrad Fund. In this case, the institute is the leading institution of the project. Another international project is Health and Psychosocial Long-term Effects and Coping Resources in Severe or Critical COVID-19 Survivors funded by the Alliance of International Science Organizations (ANSO) (a leading institution, the Bulgarian Academy of Science).

The evaluation panel also commented on the lower proportion of publications in middle to high-ranked journals, and suggested increasing internationalisation as the way to improve this indicator. Since the last accreditation, the researchers of the institute established many fruitful partnerships and intensive cooperation with research partners abroad. This has led to an increase of publication numbers in the category of middle to high-ranked journals. To express it in numbers,

the share of low-impacted and medium to high impacted studies in the previous accreditation period (2012 to 2015) for the IEP was 35(LI): 12(M-HI), however in this accreditation period it was 41(LI): 42(M-HI), and even for the last two years (2020-2021), the share was the opposite, which means that more studies were published in middle-to-high impacted journals than in low-impacted (28:15).

The evaluation panel also recommended the further development of inter-disciplinarity, also due to recent merger of the institute and the forming of the Center for the Social and Psychological Sciences. In this accreditation period, the researchers of the institute searched for an opportunity to develop additional inter-disciplinarity partnerships, especially in the areas of their expertise. This inter-disciplinary partnership was facilitated both inside the Centre as well as outside the centre. Inside the centre, the researchers actively worked on interconnections between the institutes of the centre, which resulted in joint research projects, e.g. VEGA 2/0118/17 (Risk assessment in decision making of individuals on the personal and company/business finances and business opportunities), Entrances Horizon 2020 etc., in which we have cooperated with economists and sociologists. Our inter-disciplinary cooperation resulted also in several edited books with other social scientists (e.g. political science, social anthropology). The researchers of the institute also participate in medicine-related projects (LISPER, BIOFORD) funded by European structural and investment funds. Outside the Centre, we created especially fruitful collaboration with the six institutes participating in the project "Creative Science" and "Find the scientists in yourself" (Institute of Materials and Machine Mechanics, Polymer Institute, Institute of Chemistry, Institute for Heart Research, Institute of Experimental Pharmacology & Toxicology - Centre of Experimental Medicine SAS).

Concerning the journal *Studia Psychologica*, the accreditation panel recommended we increase its internalisation, especially with regard to its rather low impact. The editorial board and editorial office were working on this issue systematically in three areas – development and maintaining of the database of international reviewers, development of journal features which contribute to the international attractiveness of the journal (e.g., open science badges) and increasing the role of international members of the editorial board and hosting editors. Recently, we have published our first special issue edited exclusively by international hosting editors on Psychological Roots of Questionable Health Practices. All these activities led to an increase of the journal's JCR impact factor from 0.511 in 2016 to 0.953 in 2021.

The recommendations of the international assessment meta-panel were taken into account by the team of **the Institute of Social Sciences** as follows:

- 1) Higher activity in acquiring international (not only bilateral) projects resulted in the implementation of two projects under the scheme Interreg Danube Transnational Programme ([RARE-DTP1-320-4.1](#); [DREAM ROAD-DTP-3-383-4.1](#)), two projects funded by EEA Grants ([CBC01030](#); [GGC01007](#)), one project financed by Visegrad Fund ([No. 22030354](#)) and one project under the scheme Horizon 2020 ([UrbanHist](#) No. 721933). Besides these, in 2020, our team was involved in applying for the COST project titled *Border Regions as Living Spaces (BORDELIVES)* in cooperation with the Centre for Borders Region Studies the University of Southern Denmark as a lead partner. Despite its great potential and the quality, the project application was not successful. At the end of 2021 we participated in the preparation of another project under the scheme of the Visegrad Fund titled *Migrants and refugees in secondary cities in the CEE region: Challenges and opportunities for local policy-making focused on an inclusive public sphere*. As regards the participation in EU Frame Projects, more activity in these area will be done in 2022 and 2023. Currently, one of our colleagues (Veronika Szeggy-Gayer) is participating in an ERC project titled „[NEPOSTRANS](#) – Negotiating post-imperial transitions: from remobilization to nation-state consolidation. A comparative study of local and regional transitions in post-Habsburg East and Central Europe“ coordinated by Institute of Political History, Budapest.

- 2) Publishing more in world languages increased considerably in comparison with the last evaluated period. Also, articles in the journal *Individual and Society* [Človek a spoločnosť] have been published only in English since 2018. But not only this, great change to the composition has happened in the publications as well. The amount of the studies published in CCC journals and in journals indexed in WoS Core Collection or SCOPUS has increased from 5 publications in the last evaluated period (2012-2015) to 40 publications in this period (2016–2021). A slight increase is seen as well in chapters in monographs published abroad (from 12 to 16).
- 3) Enforcing inter-disciplinary research is seen in most of the projects carried out in the Centre. As already mentioned by the Institute of Experimental Psychology, our researchers participate in many national or international projects and cooperate on joint studies with researchers from other institutes (not only from the Centre). For instance, in the projects RARE, DREAM ROAD, CBC, CEEA and APVV-MARGIWORK, researchers of the Institute of Social Sciences (historians, psychologists, economists) cooperate with colleagues (economists, sociologists) from the Institute for Forecasting CSPS SAS. In the new project VEGA, which focused on psychological constructs and contextual frameworks determining the intention of girls and women to study information and communication technology (ICT), psychologists of both institutes of the Centre cooperate together. An extraordinary inter-disciplinary project team was created during the implementation of the project APVV. Together worked psychologists and historians of the Institute of Social Sciences, a demographer of the Institute for Forecasting and other historians, sociologists, and political scientists from the Pavol Jozef Šafárik University. Historians and psychologists of the Institute of Social Sciences cooperate together as well on several other projects (VEGA; ESS) including the currently carried out European Structural and Investment Funds projects (in cooperation with researchers from the Biomedical Research Centre SAS).
- 4) The researchers of the Institute of Social Sciences tried to fulfill the focus on local problems with its much wider international visibility in several ways: a) through projects with a very important social impact (APVV-15-0475; VEGA 2/0084/19, 2/0012/19; 1/0212/15; CBC01030); b) by publishing more in foreign languages; c) thanks to participation at conferences abroad and wide popularisation of the research (in media, press, on TV, social networks etc.) This research still remains one of the core focus of the historical research of the Institute.
- 5) Continued cooperation with stable partners from the Czech Republic, Hungary, Poland and Ukraine strengthened in recent years and new collaborations started with partners from Norway (NORCE), Ukraine (City Kharkiv, V.N. Karazin Kharkiv National University and Simon Kuznets Kharkiv National University of Economics; Uzhhorod National University), Germany (Collegium Carolinum), Slovenia (RIS Dvorec Rakičan), USA (Denison University, Ohio; University of Texas at El Paso, Texas), Estonia (University of Tartu), Poland (SGH Warsaw School of Economics; University of Zielona Góra), Finland (University Jyväskylä), England (University of Liverpool), Japan (University of Kitakyushu) etc. New regional cooperations started thanks to our increasing regional visibility (with Carpathian foundation, ETP Slovensko, City Košice, Institute of Roma studies, CIKE, IUVENTA, workshops for Secondary School of Electrical Engineering).

The profile of the Institute of Social Sciences is connected with the profile of the Centre as a whole, given by our common research strategy for the years 2021 - 2025. Our flagship remains the European Social Survey and after successful completion of the project, focusing on a comparative research of ethnic minorities, we plan to continue in this type of comparative research again (a new APVV is going to be submitted in November, 2022).

The previous accreditation delivered recommendations for **the Institute for Forecasting**. All recommendations have been well received by the management and researchers of the Institute

and a number of actions were taken and initiatives were developed during the period 2016-2021 to fully use the potential of the recommendations, including the following steps (structured by recommendations of the panel):

- 1) Recommendation: Identify the missing crucial skills and better align the recruitment strategy with such skills needs. We have identified the need to support skills in both quantitative and interdisciplinary data analyses. In relation to that, two researchers who have finalised their PhDs have been employed by the institute, one with strong background in quantitative analyses and mathematics (D. Dokupilová) and one with strong skills and knowledge in the area of social interventions (Z. Poláčková). To further support the recruitment potential in the area of quantitative forecast skills, we have developed cooperation with the University of Economics and opened a new PhD programme with the Faculty of National Economics with a track record in recruiting PhD students in the area of quantitative skills. The PhD programme is launched this year and we expect the PhD students will be immediately involved in the research project especially in quantitative analysis, thus increasing the pool of future employees who will support the capacity quantitative forecast methods and analyses. We have opened a senior position and succeeded in attracting one of the leading talents in the area of policy analyses who joined our institute in 2019 (L. Mýtka Kureková). In the medium-term we are developing cooperation across other research organisations to accelerate our research potential in the area of forecast, foresight and policy recommendations (the prestigious Institute of Financial Policy at the Ministry of Finance, Universities, cooperation within SAS)
- 2) Recommendation: The Institute could benefit from engaging with new and innovative datasets that are increasingly becoming available to social scientists. This recommendation has been very welcome and corresponds well with both the strategic development of the Institute outwards as well as within the Centre. Researchers have developed research based on publicly available datasets at a micro level based on agreements with Eurostat (Labour Force Survey, Adult Education Survey), PIAAC (Programme for International Assessment of Adult Competencies) as well as individual data available on the basis of organisational requests from public organisations in Slovakia (micro data on employment from the Ministry of Employment). We have financially supported access to the dataset of companies (covering all companies) which is being used for analyses of the enterprise eco- system (Database Finstat).
- 3) Recommendation: The Institute and the new Centre could better benefit from enhancing (or joining together) research support services (language editing etc.) This recommendation has been addressed both at the level of the Institute (support to proofreading, graphic services) and the level of the Centre. The Institute launched an internal project at the level of the Centre, where all Institutes of the Centre participated under guidance of the Centre's director. Within this first stage of the project, in cooperation with external professional consultancy, internal processes were mapped and the main stages of introducing common processes have been defined. The first outputs have been the introduction of two common guidelines for a performance-based remuneration system. The Institute for Forecasting is the leading Institute of the Centre in terms of acquiring extra-budgetary projects both internationally and nationally. The total project capacity has dramatically increased in the volume of international and national project which have been won in competitions or provided on individual bases from national actors. This has increased the stress on the administrative and financial support structures and processes. Subsequently, in 2021, at Institute level we launched an internal project to adjust and develop an adequate structure for professional support to project administration and management.
- 4) Recommendation: The Institute could benefit from better aligning its overall publication strategy and the way PhD thesis are supervised. The publication intensity and a more balanced involvement of a wider base of researchers has improved. Researchers of the Institute have increased cooperation in their publications both within the Institute, within the Centre and externally - leveraging international cooperation within a project consortium, international networks, and also utilising wider national networks of research bodies

PhD programmes have changed greatly, with two new programmes opened and the previous programme terminated (as it has not been well aligned with the research focus of the Institute). The number of PhD student has increased as well as the number of senior researchers-supervisors. PhD students are offered cooperation on the research projects and the supervision of PhD thesis is supported via internal management processes, which is also supported by the newly introduced scientific council at the level of the Centre (planned in 2018, and implemented in 2022).

4. Research strategy and future development of the Centre for the next five years (Recommended 3 pages, max. 5 pages) **Research strategy of the institute in the national and international contexts, objectives, and methods (including the information on when the strategy was adopted).**

The Research strategy of the CSPS is updated every year and it is published in Annual Reports and presented at annual meetings of the Centre's employees, familiarly called "Centrovica". The research strategy and plans are regularly discussed at management meetings, consulted at the meetings with the Scientific Board and International Advisory Board. The CSPS strives for research progress at the level of three organizational units of the CSPS (Institute of Forecasting, Institute of Social Sciences and Institute of Experimental Psychology), while encouraging opportunities for inter-disciplinary cooperation across organizations. The CSPS institutes cooperate in national and international projects and have the long-term intention to continue with this trend, which creates opportunities for inter-disciplinary enrichment, and development of scientific disciplines and human resources. **Inter-disciplinary teams show increased flexibility in solving project tasks and are successful in publishing research results.**

The main areas of research for the period 2021-2025 at national (regional) and international level are:

- **Research of social trends/phenomenons;** Topics: Study of attitudes - European Social Probe, Trust in institutions, in new infrastructures (biobanks); Social entrepreneurship; Migration/migration trends; Family and reproductive behaviour; Labour market analysis; Staff and student mobility, Political culture and populism; Pandemic COVID -19; Gender studies;
- **Cognitive processes and skills;** Topics: Cognitive bias; Unsubstantiated beliefs and conspiracies and their reduction; Decision-making;
- **Environmental studies;** Topics: Decarbonization; Energy poverty and energy efficiency; Cities (green cities, Luník IX, public space); Marginalized community infrastructures; Climate neutrality; Urban history;
- **Education and schooling;** Topics: Lifelong learning; Inclusive education; Upskilling; National education; STEM & IT; Roma community);
- **Quality of life;** Topics: Retirement; Cancer patients; Pandemic; Marginalized groups.
- **Historical research;** Ethnic and national minorities, Urban and regional studies, Education and school systems.

Concerning the research strategy in the methodology of our psychology research, we aim to focus more on longitudinal research. Most of the research in the area of our topics are cross-sectional, which has a limited capacity to confirm causality. Longitudinal research has its advantage over the cross-sectional methodological design is mainly that it provides a complex picture of the relationships between the selected variables and reduces biases based on the shared method variance.

Concerning new topics, the situation of the pandemic showed us how important it is to reflect the current societal situation. Our research on the pandemic brought not only significant scientific knowledge at both national and international levels, but also had a strong societal impact. **Therefore, we adopted a strategy to focus on the research topics, which can be identified as important and/or sensitive societal issues and problems.** Through this strategy, we want to deepen the social relevance of our research. In the research area addressing the expected and observed impacts of **green transition** we aim to continue with the research on energy transition from coal to carbon and the effect on society. In the area of **digital transition**, research on the skills transition in the (automotive) industry has been launched. Digital and green transition are identified as important elements of the research strategy also for the upcoming years, with the intention **to increase connections within and cooperations** outside the Centre.

To further develop international recognition of our research, we plan to continue in our rich international cooperation. We would like to deepen this cooperation, although it is sometimes managed by the cooperating institution and therefore related to the topics which are preferred by our research partners from abroad, especially those with a strong international position. However, we would also like to strengthen our international position by searching for partners who can help us **to internationalize our research topics**. We are planning to search for partners with similar topic orientation to attract them to join our projects. We believe that this will help us to expand topics internationally. We adopted this strategy for the first time when we were preparing an international project funded by the Visegrad Fund on Political culture, democratic values and misinformation. In this case, the Centre is a leading institution, and the international research team was built through active searching and approaching the institution abroad.

Being successful with project application brought us project partners, relevant topics, significant publications but also a burden to the administration. One of the priorities for the research strategy for the upcoming project participation is to **build and operate project infrastructure** in the Centre. The importance of this step is two-fold: improve and facilitate project administration and transform the burden from i) researchers and ii) the administration unit to the project managers;

Another objective is to **oversee and enhance the overall quality of the PhD. programmes**. We aim to focus on i) periodical evaluation of PhD studies grants and supervisors; ii) PhD students. Also, conditions for international internships and research stays of PhD students, post-docs and researchers will be fully-supported. We will continue in supporting our young researchers in their professional career - in their participation in the research projects (national and EU schemes), in increasing their visibility in the scientific field by creating new cooperation and network connections, and supporting them in applying for student programs abroad (e.g., applications for the US Fulbright Program in 2022).

There is also one objective aimed at securing the quality of the monographs via **establishing the Centre's publishing house** with an editorial board that will oversee the review processes of monographs and other publications. **Maintaining and increasing the quality of the Centre's journals** is another important point in the future development that needs to be mentioned. We plan to open more calls for monothematic issues on up-to-date topics and to invite foreign editors. With growing numbers of submissions we aim also for expanding the database of international reviewers.

We aim at **keeping and promoting the principles of Open Science**. Within the Slovak reproducibility network (SRN) in which the Centre is one of the established institutions, we want to play a significant role in presenting open science. We are organizing a symposium devoted to SRN activities at the international conference "Social processes and personality" in 2022. SRN is active in cooperation with other national reproducibility networks around the world.

The CSPS has recently adopted two significant documents that we aim to follow. In line with the **gender equality plan** of the SAS we commit to the policy of striving for transforming organisational processes, cultures and structures to reduce gender imbalances and inequalities. We will focus on promoting career opportunities and equal access to resources for all genders. Regarding the **environmental policy**, we are aware of the importance of the ecological sustainability of daily activities and the Centre is committed to the continuous improvement of its activities in order to minimize its environmental impact on the environment.

The Centre's management continues with **cooperation and consultations with the International Advisory Board** aiming to support the CSPS actions to proceed with a confidence on the road towards the further enhancement of its performance.

The research outcomes make our researchers recognized as **experts and our expertise** will continue in cooperation with the ministries, foundations (Carpathian Foundation), state institutes (National Institute for Certified Educational Measurements) and associations (IT Association of Slovakia). The Centre has been able to accelerate capacity to identify and develop research evidence that would **inform strategic policy decisions** in response to the most acute problems of socio economic and environmental challenges such as digital and green transitions.

To conclude, we perceive the merger of our three independent institutes into the Centre of Social and Psychological Sciences, which happened in 2015, as **a success story** that enabled the researchers to start larger inter-disciplinary projects that provide comprehensive and robust research beyond the boundaries of one discipline in the study of society relevant phenomena. We want to continue this strategy, as the view of one discipline can be limited and provide only partial scientific insight into the issues. Our strategy is to work on connecting research teams within the center (and actually, outside the center) and stimulate the emergence of further inter-disciplinary projects aimed at solving relevant societal problems. We believe that through such a strategy, we can add specific value to our research results and bring additional benefits to society.
