**Foreign Visitors Fellowship Program  
Application form 2008-2009**

The Slavic Research Center of Hokkaido University is pleased to announce the thirtieth round of the Foreign Visiting Fellowship Program for 2008-2009. Foreign specialists in studies of the former Soviet and East European countries, who are interested in spending some ten months at the Slavic Research Center during the academic year of 2008-2009 (June to March), are invited to submit applications for this program.

**Conditions of Awards**

The Center undertakes to provide the following:

- (1) One round-trip air ticket (economy-class) between the place of work of a fellow and Sapporo. Fellows are welcome to bring their family, but at their own expense. Fellows must pay shipping and customs clearance charges for their own luggage.
- (2) A living allowance around 480,000 yen per month. In addition, there will be a one-time financial allowance of around 80,000 yen for professional trips in Japan.
- (3) Inexpensive accommodation in the University's Foreign Scholars' Residence. The current rates are around 6,000 yen (single), 15,000 yen (twin) and 37,000 yen (family) per month, depending on the size of flat. Gas, electricity, water, heating and telephone must be paid separately.
- (4) A travel allowance for daily commuting to and from the Center.
- (5) An office at the Center (with the use of a personal computer) and access to all the University and library facilities. Secretarial service is not provided.
- (6) The social (medical) insurance will be available at the visiting scholar's expense.
- (7) The visiting scholar is expected to spend at least nine months at the Slavic Research Center, but is free during that period to engage in a limited amount of travel for professional purposes. Foreign travel must be approved by the director and must be taken out of the visiting scholar's paid holidays (10-15 days).

The above-mentioned conditions are preliminary ones. They might be changed when the details of the program will be finally determined in 2007-08.

**Obligations**

Fellows have the following obligations to the Center:

- (1) As the Center is a research institution, there are no teaching duties, but the visiting scholar is expected to be available for talks and consultation with the members of the staff and graduate students.
- (2) The Center will expect fellows to give at least two formal presentations at SRC's regular symposia or other academic meetings in Japan.
- (3) The Center will further expect fellows to contribute an article during their stay in Sapporo to the Center's international refereed journal *Acta Slavica Iaponica* on a subject within the broad confines of Slavic, Russian, and East European studies.

## Application

Applicants should submit applications for this program by the deadline (March 31, 2007). The application form is available from the SRC's website (<http://src-h.slav.hokudai.ac.jp/index-e.html>). Each applicant is expected to have at least two letters of reference sent directly to the Center: one letter from the institution to which the applicant is attached, testifying that he or she will be free during the duration of the stay in Sapporo, and another confidential letter from a recognized specialist in their field. It is the responsibility of applicants to make sure that letters of reference should arrive at the Center by the deadline.

## Selection

The selection will be conducted during April-July 2007, carefully examining the applicants' research plans, academic achievements, possible contributions to the SRC's projects and other factors.

Also, preference will be given to those who have either firm academic positions and PhD degrees (or their equivalents).

## Notification

Applicants will be informed of selection results by mid-July, 2007.
